New spirometry suite opens at our Askham Bar site

Last week, we opened our new Spirometry Suite at the York Vaccination Centre at Askham Bar, where we'll be carrying out spirometry tests on behalf of our member GP practices. Spirometry is a simple test used to help diagnose and monitor certain lung conditions by measuring how much air you can breathe out in one forced breath.



During the pandemic, GP Practices had to pause Spirometry testing due to the potential risk of spreading Covid-19. This means that hundreds of people across the country have had to wait for testing to get the results that could confirm a diagnosis of respiratory problems.

Our dedicated Spirometry Suite (pictured left) is located within our new, temporary, modular building at the Askham Bar site and opened last Wednesday, 9 March. It contains specialist equipment and has the necessary ventilation required for the safe testing of patients. This is another example of how our member GP practices have joined together to help our community recover.

Thumbs up for our babies and children's clinic

A York mum has given our babies and children's clinic, which is located at our Askham Bar site, a huge thumbs up. Lucy said she was 'hugely impressed' with the team at our Children's Ambulatory Treatment Hub, adding: "The team there is really knowledgeable and the whole process was so fluid."

Lucy has used the service for both her four-year-old and 13 month-old daughters. Her eldest daughter suffers with recurrent viral induced wheeze and, in the past, has had to go to hospital as a result of her condition.

Lucy said: "We have used the new service several times, it's such a helpful step between hospital support and our GP, who has limited capacity. It's a win-win situation for everybody."

When her younger daughter developed bronchiolitis, Lucy was able to get vital support for her too, explaining: "They were amazing - initially they observed her and wanted to monitor her again during her nap. Her oxygen levels had dropped and they picked it up quickly as this needed addressing. This is such a valuable and much needed service, especially in the winter."

Another piece of good news that I'm delighted to share with you this week is that our Chair, Professor Mike Holmes, has been elected as the next Chair of the RCGP's (Royal College of GPs) Trustee Board.

Overseas Vaccine Validation Service launched

A new Overseas Vaccine Validation Service will be launched next Wednesday, 23 March, to capture evidence of Covid-19 vaccinations administered in countries outside of England and have them recorded in the National Immunisation Management System (NIMS). We'll be operating this service from the York Vaccination Centre at Askham Bar from Monday to Friday. Appointments can be booked through the National Booking System for patients who:

- are aged 18 or over
- have an NHS number
- have received a Covid vaccine dose outside of England that is one of the four MHRA-approved vaccine types used in England; Astra Zeneca (Vaxzevria), Pfizer (Comirnaty), Janssen or Moderna (Spikevax).
