A message from Maddy...



To ensure that eligible patients have had plenty of opportunity to get their Flu and Covid-19 booster vaccinations, we've been holding pop-up vaccination clinics at locations across the city, including Monks Cross shopping centre and at our Acomb Garth Community Care Centre. Last week we administered 773 flu vaccinations and 600 Covid jabs.

Following a review of the national Covid vaccination programme, a decision has been taken to stand down the three national vaccination centres based in Scunthorpe, York and Hull with effect from next Friday, 16 December. We will, of course, continue to support our local vaccination service here in York, working with our 11 member GP practices. Currently there is no national guidance around further booster programmes, but we may receive information about future plans later this month. We're very proud to have delivered more than 650,000 Covid vaccinations through our local and national vaccination services to date. Meanwhile, our Children's Ambulatory Treatment (CAT) Hub saw a total of 33 patients last week and was featured on BBC Look North, helping to raise awareness of Respiratory Syncytial Virus in babies and children.

Feeling festive at Acomb Garth

Last week, we marked the start of the festive season with a special event at our Acomb Garth Community Care Centre to thank our hardworking staff and volunteers. I'm very grateful to everyone who helped to make the evening such a success, including colleagues and The Yorkshire Party People for making sure that Acomb Garth was looking suitably Christmassy for the occasion, Singing For All for the

Green Summit success

Last month, we hosted the first York and North Yorkshire Primary Care Green Summit at the Novotel in York. The idea was to bring York-based primary care teams together with colleagues from Heartbeat and Yorkshire Health Network GP federations with an interest in sustainability. The aim of the summit was to help us understand what more we can do to help patient health and the planet, and it was facilitated by healthcare professionals with a special interest in greener healthcare. We want to create sustainability champions within each federation and establish leads from across all practices with each Primary Care Network, developing a support network for our area. The programme included three workshops hosted by Dr Rumina Önaç, GP, Chair of Sustainable Practices York and the Royal College of General Practitioners' Sustainable Healthcare Lead for Humber and the Ridings; Dr Aarti Bansal, GP with Special Interest in Respiratory and Net Zero GP Lead for the Humber and North Yorkshire Health and Care Partnership; and Dr Matthew Sawyer, GP and Director of SEE Sustainability.

Making our website accessible

I'm pleased to report that we've recently conducted an indepth review of our <u>website</u> to ensure that it's as accessible as possible to all users. Our Quality Committee was particularly pleased with the outcome of this piece of work, which showed that, according to the <u>Lighthouse</u> <u>Accessibility Rating</u>, the pages on our website all have a high accessibility rating. In future, we're aiming to have an accessibility rating of 85% or higher for every page on our website and would encourage our member GP practices to use the Lighthouse tool to review the accessibility of their websites too.

York Place Director appointed

It has been announced that Sarah Coltman-Lovell will take up the post of Place Director for York from 19 December. Sarah is currently the Interim Director of Strategic Planning for the Integrated Care Board and will take over from Simon Bell, who has held the Place Director role on an interim basis since August. News from our member practices: Haxby Group

Doctors from Haxby Group were involved in a recent research project and the production of a report exploring the largest gender pay gap in medicine.

Dr Nicola Greenwood, Dr Katie Barnett and Haxby Group Practice were credited within the report, entitled 'Exploring gender differences in update of partnership roles'. They worked with the Department of Health Sciences and Centre for Health Economics at the University of York, as well as the King's Fund. The research paper was part of the PREPARE programme of work, which is a collaboration between the University of York and the King's Fund.

This piece of work confirmed that women GPs, on average, earn more than 33 per cent less than men, which is the largest gender pay gap in medicine. Even taking account of differences in hours, age, grade and experience, a 15 per cent gender pay gap remains. The project involved exploring gender differences in uptake of, and attitudes to, the partnership role. For more information, visit the <u>website</u>.
